

Distillery at 103-2323 Millstream Road – License No. 114899

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

Ryes and Shine Craft Distillery, owned by operator Kelly Darwin, recently leased the property at 103-2323 Millstream Road and is applying through the Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch (LCRB) for a Lounge Area Endorsement, which allows manufacturers to sell liquor for onsite consumption, sell samples without a daily maximum volume per person, and offer entertainment and amplified sound.

Currently, the participation of the local governments in the review of liquor license applications allows municipalities to either opt-out of the review process entirely and leave it to the licensee to post an advertisement in the newspapers and an onsite notification board to notify surrounding neighbors for comment to the LCRB, or opt-in, which includes the process of notifying the public through mail outs or advertisements. If Council wishes to comment on the application, whether positive or negative, the City will be required to opt-in and undertake the notification process.

### **BACKGROUND:**

Since 1987-88, the site has operated as a pub, with a lounge, patios, and a brewery being added over the years. The brewery opened in 2016 and was operated by a separate company known as the Axe and Barrel Brewing Company. This change of business also required a new liquor license application and review by Local Government. The Axe and Barrel closed in 2020. In 2021 a new business opened which operated as The Millstream Beverage Company Ltd. That business also closed, in July of 2024.

#### **COMMENTARY:**

Kelly Darwin, operator of the Ryes and Shine Craft Distillery, has applied to operate a distillery at 103-2323 Millstream Road. The operator has opted to apply for a Lounge Area Endorsement license. Person capacity for the Millstream Beverage Company Ltd. was 35 inside and 45 on the patio for a total of 80. The new operation is requesting an increase in person capacity to 100, with 36 inside and 64 on the patio. This occupancy load has been reviewed by the City's Building Department.

The hours of operation are proposed to be reduced slightly from the hours utilized by the former business at this location. As shown below, Ryes and Shine intends to open one hour later each day and close at 11pm, including on Fridays and Saturdays. The operator has noted that the hours may be reduced in the off-season when the patio is closed.

Bylaw Enforcement has stated that this site has historically followed regulation well enough to keep from attracting complaints or attention from the Liquor Inspectors. From a Bylaw Enforcement perspective there is little to indicate that the City should anticipate any problems, especially given that the hours are being reduced.

Should Council decide to opt into the notification process, notifications would be sent by mail to neighbours within 30 meters of the subject property, similar to that of a Development Variance Permit.

If Council decides to opt out of notification and the gathering of public input, the LCRB will direct the licensee to undertake their own notification process, including advertisements in the local newspaper and posting a notification advertisement onsite to complete their own review process.

Given that this application is to continue a similar use, Council may wish to opt out of the notification process for this application. Traditionally, the City has opted out of this process unless an application is perceived to be potentially impactful to the neighbourhood.

### **Strategic Plan Alignment**

The proposed application aligns with Section 3: Economic Development and Section 5: Good Governance of Council's Strategic Plan.

### **Financial Implications**

In this instance, the policing costs should remain the same since this is a continued use that has operated on this site for many years.

If Council decides to opt-in to notifying, the cost of providing mailouts to neighbours within 30 meters of the site would be approximately \$45. As this application is referred to us from the LCRB, there is no application fee, and the City is not able to recover the costs.

If Council decides to opt-out of comment, there would be no cost to the City for this process.

### **Legal Implications**

The authority to issue or amend liquor licenses and endorsements rests solely with the Province. The Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch does refer to Council for comment, which may give the perception that the City controls the process. Notwithstanding this perception, the City should not be found liable for the way in which the Province exercises its authority in this realm.

### **OPTIONS:**

### Option 1

THAT Council inform the Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch that the City of Langford will opt out of conducting notification for a Lounge Area Endorsement for Ryes and Shine Craft Distillery at 103-2323 Millstream Road.

### Or Option 2

THAT Council inform the Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch that the City of Langford will complete our own notification and provide the findings to the LCRB regarding the application for a Lounge Area Endorsement for Ryes and Shine Craft Distillery at 103 -2323 Millstream Road;




### 103-2323 Millstream Road

SUBJECT: Award of Construction Contract for Centre Mountain Work Package 8

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

The purpose of this staff report is to seek Council's approval to award the construction contract for Centre Mountain Work Package (WP) 8 to the lowest bidder, Coast Utility Contracting Ltd. at an amount of \$6,552,115.00 plus GST funded via the appropriate LSA fund, as recommended by the City's project consultant. The project was tendered publicly on BC Bid. The tender closed on Friday, January 31, 2025 at 2:00 p.m. A total of eight (8) bids were received. In accordance with the City's Purchasing Policy, all bids were opened and witnessed publicly. There are no known budgetary or compliance issues with the lowest bid and substantial completion is scheduled for December 2025.

For clarification, this contract is separate from the Centre Mountain Residential (CMR) and Centre Mountain Business Park (CMBP) contracts previously awarded by Council. The WP8 tender package focuses on key components of the water system (pump station, reservoir and pressure control station) that are essential to delivering on our collective obligations under the 2017 Reconciliation Agreement. This water system will be owned, operated, and maintained by the Capital Regional District (CRD) and is eligible for Juan de Fuca Water Distribution System (JDFWDS) Development Cost Charge (DCC) credits administered by the City in accordance with the CRD's bylaws and policies.

### **BACKGROUND:**

### Centre Mountain – Reconciliation and Boundary Adjustment Agreements

At the February 6, 2017 Regular Council meeting (see staff report distributed at meeting), Council approved the signing of the Reconciliation and Boundary Adjustment agreements; commonly referred to as the tripartite land swap between Beecher Bay First Nation, the District of Metchosin, and the City of Langford. This historic land swap was the beginning of the Centre Mountain development that will result in economic independence for Beecher Bay First Nation, the preservation of green space for Metchosin, and regionally beneficially services, housing, and jobs.

### Centre Mountain Development LAS/LSAs Background

At the February 22, 2022 Regular Council meeting (see agenda page 554), Council adopted the following three bylaws related to the Centre Mountain development:

- 1. Centre Mountain Water Service Local Area Service Establishment Bylaw No. 2038, 2022;
- 2. Centre Mountain Residential Community Roadway Local Area Service Establishment Bylaw No. 2040, 2022; and
- 3. Centre Mountain Business Park Community Roadway Local Area Service Establishment Bylaw No. 2042, 2022.

At the July 18, 2022 Regular Council meeting (see agenda page 405), Council adopted the following three bylaws related to the Centre Mountain development:

- 1. Centre Mountain Water Service Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 2039, 2022;
- 2. Centre Mountain Residential Community Roadway Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 2041, 2022; and
- 3. Centre Mountain Business Park Community Roadway Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 2043, 2022.

At the December 5, 2022 Regular Council meeting (see agenda page 44), Council adopted the following three additional bylaws related to the Centre Mountain development:

- 1. Centre Mountain Water Service Local Area Service Temporary Borrowing Bylaw No. 2106, 2022;
- Centre Mountain Residential Community Roadway Local Area Service Temporary Borrowing Bylaw No. 2107, 2022; and
- 3. Centre Mountain Business Park Community Roadway Local Area Service Temporary Borrowing Bylaw No. 2108, 2022.

For further background information on the Centre Mountain development LAS/LSAs, please see the staff report from February 7, 2022 Regular Council meeting (see agenda page 226).

### Centre Mountain Development Work Packages Background

The Centre Mountain development is divided into Centre Mountain Business Park (CMBP) and Centre Mountain Residential (CMR) with City Works generally phased as follows:

- Agreements/Approvals:
  - o With landowners, MOE, MoTI, CRD, Metchosin, WSES, etc.
- Earthworks:
  - Stripping, grading, blasting, scaling, retaining walls, etc.
- Civil:
  - o Deep Utilities Installation: storm drain, sanitary sewer, watermain, etc.
  - Shallow Utilities Coordination: BC Hydro, Telus, Shaw, Fortis Gas, etc.
  - o Road and Frontage Works: paving, curb/gutter, sidewalk, boulevard, landscaping, irrigation, driveways, streetlights, fence, paint, signage, etc.



For tender and construction purposes, the Centre Mountain development LAS works were divided into nine packages as follows:

- Work Package 1: CMR new roadway (east section) spanning from Happy Valley Road to approximately 350m west.
- Work Package 2: CMR new connector roadway (west section) spanning from WP1 (west limit) to the boundary of the Centre Mountain Business Park.
- Work Package 3: Sooke Road works on existing Highway 14 at the proposed Business Park access (west of the intersection of Sooke Road and West Shore Parkway).
- Work Package 4: CMBP new roadway (east section) spanning from Sooke Road intersection (WP3 limits) south to the boundary of Centre Mountain Residential (WP2 limits).
- Work Package 5: CMBP new roadway (west section) cul-du-sac with emergency access to Woodruff Road spanning from the middle of WP4 west and north towards Sooke Road (no connection to Sooke Road here).
- Work Package 6: CMR new roadway (north section) spanning from the west end of WP2 to the proposed reservoir.
- Work Package 7: Intersection improvements and/or signalization of the two new intersections at Sooke Road (CMBP) and Happy Valley Road (CMR); to be included in WP3 and WP1, respectively.
- Work Package 8: New water pump station, reservoir, and three PRVs within the Centre Mountain development (CMBP and CMR).
- Work Package 9: For material supply, as necessary (CMBP and CMR).

### **COMMENTARY:**

The project was tendered publicly on BC Bid. The tender closed on Friday, January 31, 2025 at 2:00 p.m. A total of eight (8) bids were received. In accordance with the City's Purchasing Policy, all bids were opened and witnessed publicly. The bids were then reviewed by the City's project consultant, Stantec Consulting Ltd., who prepared the following summary of tender bid prices results in Table 1, listed in order of total bid price. The bid prices are listed exclusive of GST because the City claims the GST back.




Figure 1: WP8 Project Location Plan (not to scale)

The location of the WP8 key water system components (pump station, reservoir and pressure control station) within CMR & CMBP are as shown in Figure 1.

There are no known budgetary or compliance issues with the lowest bid and substantial completion is scheduled for December 2025 which aligns with the City's commitments under 2017 Reconciliation Agreement. Staff recommend awarding the construction contract for Centre Mountain Work Package 8 to the lowest bidder, Coast Utility Contracting Ltd., at an amount of \$6,552,115.00 plus GST.

### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:**

This construction contract will be funded via the appropriate LSA fund, as recommended by the City's project consultant. This water system will be owned, operated, and maintained by the Capital Regional District (CRD) and is eligible for Juan de Fuca Water Distribution System (JDFWDS) Development Cost Charge (DCC) credits administered by the City in accordance with the CRD's bylaws and policies.

### **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS:**

The City must either award or cancel the tender within 60 calendar days of the tender closing date.

As part of the continuing works, the landowners within the LSA boundaries have committed to granting blanket statutory rights-of-way (SRWs) for the construction period. These will be discharged when the LSA roads/utilities have been fully completed/accepted and dedicated to the City/CRD.

**SUBJECT: Local Authority Designation of Fire Inspector and Fire Investigators** 

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

The British Columbia *Fire Safety Act* (the "Act") came into effect on August 1, 2024. As part of the Act's requirements, each local government is responsible for designating persons or classes of persons, in writing, to act as the Local Authority's fire inspectors and fire investigators for the purposes of administering this Act. This designation provides the designees with the ability to utilize the powers enabled by this new legislation.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The new *Fire Safety Act* (2024) replaces the aging *Fire Services Act* (1979) with the goal of achieving a single standard for fire safety. It brings several significant changes to British Columbia and will:

- Enable local authorities to designate personnel to carry out fire inspections and fire investigations and enable local fire services to perform tactical evacuation.
- Establish an administrative penalty enforcement model to address non-compliance issues in a more direct, timely and effective manner.
- Implement a risk-based approach for fire safety compliance monitoring in municipalities.

All persons or classes of persons designated by the Local Authority to perform fire inspections and fire investigations must meet the Fire Safety Act Inspector and Investigation Training Standard. This shall be demonstrated through the completion of a Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition process. Most of the Fire Department members filling the roles outlined in this report's recommendation already meet or exceed these minimum training standards. The components that make up the minimum training standards are already part of the Fire Department's regular training program and ongoing certification of members will continue.

### **COMMENTARY:**

Staff are recommending that Council designate Langford Fire Rescue's Fire Chief Deputy Fire Chief, Assistant Fire Chief, Captains, Lieutenants, or Fire Prevention Officer as fire inspectors and fire investigators, as defined within the British Columbia *Fire Safety Act*, for the purposes of performing fire inspections and/or fire investigations within the City of Langford.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the West Shore Parks & Recreation Society Members receive this report for information.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The West Shore Parks & Recreation Society members (WSPRS) approved funding for a regional parks & recreation facilities master plan that will evaluate the current state of parks & recreation facilities on the Westshore and develop a 10-20 year road map to address the growing sporting and recreational needs of the community.

Progress updates will be provided by the WSPRS CAO quarterly or following key project milestones.

### **DISCUSSION:**

The project has entered the Engagement Phase which will run until the end pf April. The final work and engagement plans have been approved. Draft surveys are in final review and are scheduled to be released February 10<sup>th</sup>, to mark the official start of the engagement process. This process will include 2 community surveys, one aimed at residents and the other at community groups and inperson community assessment and engagement sessions, scheduled for March 11<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> in each of the five member municipalities. In addition to the in-person sessions, there will be two virtual community engagement sessions, virtual sessions with mayors and councils as well as interviews with key stakeholders.

West Shore Parks & Recreation staff are working with the consultants to develop a marketing package to engage the public which will be shared with the member municipality's communications staff.

An inventory of the current Westshore facilities is being compiled, along with planning documents, usage statistics and demographics.

### **BUDGET IMPLICATIONS:**

The approved budget for the West Shore Parks & Recreation Facilities Master Plan project is \$140,000. To date, \$4,784 has been incurred, which will be included in the project's quarterly financial status report to the Society members' financial officers.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

The City of Langford Sewer Utility Bylaw No. 1600 sets forth requirements for sanitary sewer servicing that includes items such as connection, disconnection, fees and charges, and maintenance and use.

The Sewer Utility Bylaw No. 1600 relates to the City's agreement with Bluestem Utilities (previously Corix), operating in Langford as West Shore Environmental Services (WSES) who is the City's sewer provider. Bluestem Utilities and WSES are part of Nexus Water Group.

The purpose of this report is to bring forward user fees and charges for 2025 for Council's consideration.

### **COMMENTARY:**

Sewer Utility Bylaw No. 1600 was adopted in February 2016. It replaced an older bylaw by modernizing it and setting a fee structure for five consecutive years, including 2015 through to and including 2019 (Schedule B of Bylaw No. 1600).

Since the end of 2019, the Sewer Utility Bylaw No. 1600 has been amended annually for fee adjustments primarily based on the cost of living. Council may choose in the future to determine fees and charges either on an annual basis or for multiple consecutive years, however, at this time, staff are proposing consideration of fees and charges for 2025 only.

WSES has proposed the following for fees and charges for 2025:

Statistics British Columbia reports that the latest twelve-month average consumer price index for "All Items" in Victoria is 2.6%. In recognition of recent discussions with Administration, Bluestem will freeze SCRF rates for a third consecutive year. WSES is proposing **an increase of 2.6% to the User Fees and no change to SCRF's effective January 1, 2025**. This would increase annual User Fees from \$324.05 to \$332.48, an increase of \$0.70/month.

Sewer Utility Bylaw No. 1600, 2016, Amendment No. 8, Bylaw No. 2222, 2025 has been prepared to reflect the SCRF's being frozen and an increase to the user rates of 2.6%. The bylaw is attached to this



report for Council's consideration of first three readings. Although not yet published at the time of WSES's letter to the City, the Victoria Consumer Price Index has been published at 2.5% for 2024. Staff feel that an increase of 2.6% to the user fee is acceptable to maintain the utility's financial sustainability with rising costs of labour and materials.


Staff will continue to work with WSES towards finalizing the full review of the contract and financial modelling as directed by Council. It's expected that staff will bring this before Council in 2025.

### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

Sewer user fees are paid to WSES by the end user, for example a resident or a business. SCRF's are in effect a connection charge that are paid by a property owner looking to connect to the sewer utility. There is no direct cost to the City associated with an increase to the sewer rates.

Increasing the user fee by a percentage in line with CPI allows the utility to keep up with inflationary pressures and ensure that it remains financially sustainable.

The following chart compares the City's sewer user fee against area municipalities based on 2020 data:



As can be seen above, Langford's rates are lower than the average of the other municipalities and staff does not anticipate that this increase will bring the City over the average.

### **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS:**

If the current Bylaw No. 1600 Sewer Utility Bylaw is not amended to change the rates from 2024, then those rates would inherently carry forward to 2025. The contract also stipulates a dispute resolution process that WSES may wish to pursue if the City were to not approve the requested increase in rates.
